### 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curricular designing at the college level has very little scope since it has to adhere to the syllabus prescribed by Mangalore University to which it is affiliated. However, this has not deterred the departments from introducing certificate courses.

Networking and Functional English course are supplements to enhance value addition and for increasing the competency in the students. The departments also prepares an academic calendar covering enrichment programmes to be undertaken as department activity or extension activity in order to seek advanced knowledge.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Every department adopts some innovative process in teaching and learning though the college is affiliated to Mangalore University

- The HoDs of the different subjects convene a meeting at the end of each academic session to discuss the academic calendar, lesson plan and time required for the completion of the portion (work-diary). Term-wise allocation of subjects, syllabus allotment, tests, assignments, for the next semester session is also discussed
- The Departments organize and co-ordinate students' seminars, quiz contests, Poetry/Drama, Folk culture, creative writing assignments as well as add-on courses
- Field study, Industrial visits and project works are carried out by the departments
- Various associations/cells have undertaken certificate courses as enrichment programmes
- Motivational talk by the staff-members and administrative staff have helped in creating a positive impact on the students
- Headlines of the News, Proverbs and announcements during assembly are done by the students
- The faculty facilitate interactive and participatory approach towards students in imparting curriculum, so as to create a feeling of experiential learning based on reflective and analytical methods

## **Best Practice 2:**

### **Title of the Practice: Fostering Team Spirit and Unity through the Promotion of Local Culture**

**The Context:** Besant Women's College situated in Mangaluru, which is on the West Coast of India, is a vibrant city known for its unique cultural heritage. However, today the essence of the local culture is slowly disappearing. The youth are deprived of an awareness of the traditional culture. Hence efforts are made to preserve and nurture the rich cultural heritage of the region by organizing various folk culture related activities and celebrating festivals.

'**A royal treat in the month of Aashaad**'- '*AATIDONJI KOOTA*', is the first of the series of activities organized, to provide an exposure to the local culture.

In the month of July, on the day fixed, the students guided by the Faculty do the necessary planning and delegate responsibilities to the different classes to cook traditional dishes at home and share it among all the stakeholders of the college.

**The Practice:** In July, the month of Aashad, ('*Aati*') the Folk culture Club initiates various activities related to the revitalize Folklore. Students and teachers voluntarily contribute to the preparation of the special food items irrespective of the communities they belong to. An eminent personality acquainted with the various customs and traditions expounds the significance through interesting talks, stories, and songs. All the stakeholders and the guests are served the special *Aati* lunch, with more than 30 items on the Menu. The *Aati* activities conclude mid August but the spirit of festivity continues with the celebration of Festivals. Competitions related to various festivals are held

**Evidence of Success/ Impact:** The Students and the staff have always looked forward to the activities and celebrations. The activities have not only added to the strong bond between teachers and the taught but has also inculcated a feeling of unity and oneness among students. The celebration of festivals have helped to foster a peaceful atmosphere of mutual trust, understanding and communal harmony
